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CAMPING IN SINGLETON

Lake St Clair

Carrowbrook Road, Singleton

This picturesque lake which nestles in the undulating hills of the Hunter Valley was formed behind the walls of Glennies Creek Dam after its completion in 1983.

Lake St Clair provides Singleton with a water supply and areas for recreational activities such as water skiing, fishing and boating. The park is ideal for picnicking and barbeques.

The creek and dam are named after James Glennie, a former captain in the Royal Navy who was granted creek frontage land near the Hunter River junction in 1824. The lake takes its name from historic St Clair homestead now inundated by the waters.

FACILITIES

- ▶ 11 powered sites
- ▶ 135 hectares of vacant land for camping
- ▶ Hot showers
- ▶ Toilets
- ▶ Electric and wood fired BBQ's
- ▶ Concrete Boat Ramp

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

0.5 km north of the Singleton Crossing Bridge turn right onto Bridgman Road and follow Bridgman and Carrowbrook Roads for 35 km. A turn off to the left 27 km will take you to the dam wall or proceed a further 8 km to reach Lake St Clair Recreation Park.

Mount Royal National Park

Mount Royal National Park conserves 3,340 hectares adjoining the south-western edge of Barrington Tops National Park.

It was proclaimed in October 1996 to protect a unique wilderness that is home to many rare and threatened species of fauna. With its cool temperature and high altitude weather patterns, it's a tranquil and scenic area to enjoy.

The Mount Royal Road to Youngville picnic area is a gravel road suitable for two wheel drive vehicles. This road links up with the Upper Falbrook and Cassells Road.

All roads into the park are unsealed and visitors are advised to check conditions following rain, which can make the roads muddy and rough. Taking caravans into the park is not possible.

Camping is permitted next to the picnic area.

FACILITIES

- ▶ BBQ
- ▶ Sheltered tables
- ▶ Toilets

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

0.5 km north of the Singleton Crossing Bridge turn right onto Bridgman Road and following Bridgman and Carrowbrook Roads for 50 km. Entrance into the park is via Mt Royal Road.

McNamara Park

Wollombi Street, Broke

The village of Broke is situated on the banks of the Wollombi Brook at the western end of the Brokenback Range and nestled on the edge of the Yengo National Park.

For those with an adventurous spirit camping at McNamara Park may be an option for your stay in Broke. Bush camping is permitted. Camping is only allowed for a maximum of 3 nights.

FACILITIES

To ensure you are fully prepared for setting up camp in McNamara Park please note:

- ▶ Basic toilet facilities available
- ▶ Powered sites are not available
- ▶ No formal bathing facilities
- ▶ No fresh water supply
- ▶ Camping is free of charge
- ▶ Camping is at own risk

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

From Singleton, drive along John Street over the rail bridge and onto the Putty Road. Turn left onto Broke Road. Follow Broke Road and you'll see McNamara Park on your right as you approach the village of Broke.
